It came out of the blue. What David Bohne thought was sciatica pain in 2006 turned out to be an inoperable Non-Hodgkin lymphoma in his hip that over the course of several months grew to the size of a football. "Most people who haven't had a serious brush with cancer cannot possibly understand the terror of facing one's own mortality," David says.

As luck would have it, David received a brand new FDA approved chemotherapy that had been developed in France, and his tumor began to shrink. Months later, he was able to complete his successful treatment with radiation. "Confronting death gave me a greater appreciation for life. Every day is a blessing."

Years later, David and his husband of 57 years, Thomas Bye, were so happy to hear about the Cancer Support Community (CSC) and to become supporters. "It brings me great joy knowing that others will be able to enjoy and benefit from their services for years to come, even though I wasn't able to myself," says David.

"And we are very pleased to support CSC's move to Lafayette as well. The new center will be so lovely and peaceful."
